Your Donations at Work

enerous donations and membership dues
paid for lots of person power, restoration and
education at Hendricks Park in 2022. Friends of
Hendricks Park paid half the salary of the
Hendricks Park Volunteer Coordinator. We also
worked with Eugene Parks and Open Space to
hire a new Volunteer Coordinator when Christina
Bentrup left us. We supported enhancements in
the forest (invasive plant removal, new native
plantings, watering new plantings and restoration), and paid for a part-time seasonal employee



to work in the forest removing invasive plants. In the Rhododendron Garden, we were able to finance two seasonal employees, a major steps replacement, professional pruning, mulching and invasive plant removal, new plant labels, and spraying for azalea lace bug. We also supported pruning, invasive plant control and new plantings to enhance the Native Plant Garden. In all, the Friends invested over \$100,000 in park improvements in 2022.

The Friends are so grateful for our wonderful volunteers. Last year, we hosted 2281 volunteer



hours in the Rhododendron Garden, 808 in the Native Plant Garden and 1288 in the forest. And for the first time since before COVID struck in 2019, we were able to host a party for 50 of those volunteers to honor their work.

On the education front, we provided five full-time scholarships for children from the Confederated Tribes of Siletz Indians to attend the Whole Earth Nature School at Hendricks Park. We also funded three Nearby Nature camps that served young children.

In addition, the Friends hosted eight educational tours at Hendricks Park. Topics included Kalapuya Ways, Botanical Medicine, The Rhododendron Garden in Bloom, Birding, and Mushrooms. We established an agreement with the University of Oregon's Student Center for Sustainability to adopt a section of the forest adjacent to the West Trail for removal of invasive plants and secured a Youth Empowerment Grant through the City of Eugene to involve youth in the park this coming year.

A big thank you to all our members and donors for making our work possible.

Progress on the West Trail Makeover

Friends of Hendricks Park turned 20 in 2021. We marked that event with a very successful 20th Birthday Match Fundraiser. As a result, we



were able to announce last fall that we would embark on a significant makeover of the West Trail. This popular trail, lying north of and roughly parallel to Fairmount Boulevard, ran through forest that still languished under a load of blackberry, ivy and invasive shrubs.

Through the combined efforts of city staff, Walama Restoration Project and a great many stalwart volunteers, the 2.1 acres of forest lying between the trail and Fairmount has been cleared of blackberry, ivy and other invasive plants and shrubs. In late February, volunteers began planting young shrubs in an area near the east end of the trail.

Over the coming year, blackberries that grow back will be cut a second time and staff will treat the cut stems with a touch of herbicide. Ivy will re-sprout and get pulled or dug again, and initial weedy forbs will be removed. Because of these essential retreatments, the bulk of the new planting is planned for the winter of 2023-24. That delay will provide an opportunity for native plants to return from their seed banks over the coming growing season.

Right now, the area looks much more open than before and a little bare, but a surprising number of natives – candy flower, sweet cicely and others – have already emerged. It will be exciting to see what else comes back. By spring of 2024, we hope to see the beginning of a much more attractive and ecologically functional West Trail.

And then, of course, there is the area downhill and north of the trail. Stay tuned!

Students can come for a few hours and leave feeling like they have made an immediate change. Hopefully, having these work parties brings more students back to our program, back to Hendricks Park, and to other events around Eugene that work to make the environment healthier for everybody."

After school, Graham hopes to get a job at an environmental consultancy or in a similar field. "I've spent a lot of time in Oregon. Hopefully I will be able to move around and see what other kinds of environmental work are going on around the country!"



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Please Support the 2023 Parks and Open Space Levy!

In February, the city council voted to place on the May 16th ballot a 5-year levy for Parks and Open Space. The board of Friends of Hendricks Park unanimously voted to support this levy. The new levy would continue and increase services funded by the 2018 levy, in particular park security, fire abatement, illicit activity response and associated cleanup, and help fund recreation programming. The City has done a great job of maintaining and improving parks and hiking trails, providing restrooms, signage etc. Let's keep them funded! The levy would cost the average home owner \$5.38 a month.

A Call for More **Forest Keepers**

The Forest Keepers are a group of volunteers who meet 9 a.m. to noon every Saturday through June, with Angela Soto, our seasonal forest worker. Their task is to remove secondary invaders (the non-native plants that come up after Ivy and Blackberry are removed). In contrast to our monthly "Free the Forest" events, Forest Keepers Projects are designed around tasks more suited to small, adaptive crews. It's a great way to build your plant I.D. skills, meet people, and practice environmental restoration. No experience or tools required. All are welcome.

Prefer to pull ivy on your own time? Adopt a Forest Plot! Sign up to adopt an area of the forest that was recently cleared of ivy, which you undertake to visit at least four times a year at your convenience, to remove any ivy re-sprouts before they have a chance to spread.
